For instance, did you know that we have our parking lot plowed but not sidewalks and entrances? We have an individual who comes every time it snows or gets icy to ensure we all have a safe path into our warm building. We have a group who makes sure you have a safe and comfortable building to worship and share fellowship. Minute for Mission Matthew 25 Ministries (M25M)

We help provide hope for those in need every time we volunteer at Matthew 25 Ministries (M25M). When we unwrap the packaging of personal care items we are preparing a product to be included in a personal hygiene package for someone who has nothing. When we make pairs of gloves from large boxes of gloves we are preparing an item to be included in a disaster cleanup package for someone whose home or town is



no longer livable. These acts may seem trivial on our part but to someone who suddenly has nothing or may never have had anything, these packages mean hope.

In 2025, we are continuing to volunteer at Matthew 25 Ministries in Blue Ash, OH, a suburb of Cincinnati. We are part of the more than 4000 volunteers who help make M25M what it is. We go there on the third Monday of odd numbered months (i.e. Jan., Mar., May, July, Sep., and Nov.). We believe this is an excellent way to help those in need and share God's love. As a bonus, we have fun and enjoy our time together! If you'd like to join in, please let Diane know.

M25M is an international humanitarian aid and disaster relief organization helping local, national and international victims. The founder, the Rev. Wendell Mettey, believed that Matthew 25: 34-30 shows us how to help those in need. He believed that caring for a needy world is not just something we want to do, it is what we are called to do to show God's love. The people that M25M helps are not receiving a handout, but a helping hand.

M25M emphasizes rescuing and reusing products from major corporations, manufacturers, hospitals and individuals. These companies and organizations send their surplus or unsellable products to M25M to support the M25M mission. As volunteers there, we have unwrapped products from their commercial packaging to ensure that there is more product and less packaging material in the shipment. This also saves packaging material from going to a landfill in the disaster area. Since its founding in 1990, M25M has shipped more than 170,000,000 pounds of aid to people in need. Another example of rescuing and reusing products, is making sleeping mats from plastic grocery bags. To date we have donated two mats from the bags you have donated. It takes approximately 1000 bags to make a 30"x72" mat. Maryann trims the bags to get them ready and Diane weaves them into a mat. Please keep bringing in your bags – they are used quickly!

M25M strives to accomplish their goals in the most efficient way possible. In order to do this, they have established, and maintain, a network of local aid workers across the nation and the world. The local contact ensures that M25M's aid is what is needed most. These local contacts report directly on how M25M's aid can be most effective. They do not have to rely on reports from others on how to help. If the local contact says they have plenty of bottled water but they are shorthanded on cleaning supplies, then M25M sends cleaning products. As an example of how they are efficient, when disaster calls, an aid worker on site can pick up a cleanup kit (which includes a pair of latex gloves) and have everything needed to get to work quickly. Also, when we donate clean, empty medication bottles, M25M does not need to purchase them for the medical professional aid workers to dispense medications. It is another cost avoidance measure.

More than 99% of their donations, including monetary and goods (in-kind), go to programs. Less than 1% goes to administration and fund raising. Charity Navigator, an organization which provides data and tools to help guide people with their philanthropic decision making, has given M25M its highest rating – 100% and 4 stars. M25M is a federally recognized 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization. This is a very worthwhile organization. As a church, we have chosen to volunteer our time rather than providing a monetary donation.
