

Last week when the snow began, I flung the doormat aside so I could shovel the snow from our porch. We got enough snow that day to cancel church, and to quickly bury the doormat. Today is a dreary Monday, and about the most promising thing I think I can see from my window is the doormat emerging from the melting snow.

Yet there is also beauty in the color of the stern-looking, slate gray sky. And I can celebrate that Poor Will's Almanack announced the first week of early spring. The certainty of the vernal equinox coming on March 20 promises the beauty of natural color to emerge with the crocus, daffodil, and forsythia.

I offer you something different for Lent 2025 – an encouragement to listen and look for beauty. Every day. Get outside - or <u>look</u> outside and pay attention. Listen for the bird to sing or the wind to blow. Look for the flash of color when a bird or butterfly flit or flutter by, or when something begins to grow or bloom in green, yellow, or purple.

As for me, I will be taking the news and social media in smaller doses. I want to read or watch enough to know what is happening but will resist dialing in too deeply. I do not need to know everything happening in the world at every moment. I do not wish to deny the truth of what is happening in the news, or on either/any side of a political perspective. What I do want is a balanced perspective of other things that are true.

I pray that a Lenten practice of looking and listening for beauty will remind me of what is real. It is real that I am in the third third of the span of my years on this planet. It is real that the history of the world is a long span of beauty as in nature, human community, discovery, literature, art, and music. It is also real that human beings have a capacity for cruelty, selfishness, and greed that will take your breath away. But the grand truth is that God's grace and mercy will breathe the breath of abundant life in Jesus Christ into those who will walk in his ways. I also pray that I will not miss an opportunity to work for God's peace and justice.

This Lent, begin a practice of looking and listening for beauty. Keep a journal of what you see and hear. Speak up for God's justice and righteousness. And, as Walt Whitman wrote, "dismiss whatever insults your soul; and your very flesh shall be a great poem."

Lenten Project for Heifer International—March 23 and March 30

As a project for Lent, the youngest members of our congregation will once again be collecting money to purchase animals for Heifer International. The children will have their own box to collect money in the Lounge after worship on two Sundays, March 23 and March 30. When all the donations are totaled, the children will chose which animal(s) they want to buy - goat (\$120), sheep (\$120), pig (\$120), flock of chicks (\$20), flock of ducks (\$20), heifer (\$500), water buffalo (\$250), or hive of honeybees (\$30). So bring your lose change or dollar bills to support our young people as they learn more about helping others.

Heifer International is an organization which works to end hunger and poverty in partnership with the communities they serve. Their programs support entrepreneurs around the world, creating lasting change from the ground up. Their mission is to support smallholder farmers in order to sustainably address hunger and poverty in their communities while caring for the Earth. From Heifer International—

Matthew 25 Ministries Field Trip—March 17th






